#### Summary

The e-learning courses on "Statistics on International Trade in Services" (SITS) (in English) and "Statistiques du Commerce International des Services" (SCIS) (in French) were successfully organized by the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD), in cooperation with United Nations Statistics Division (UNSD) and the World Trade Organization (WTO). The courses were delivered from 11 September to 20 October 2023. The SITS 2023 course was followed by two webinars held on the 31 October 2023 while the SCIS 2023 course was followed by one webinar held on 1 November.

The total number of participants for both the SITS 2023 (English) and SCIS 2023 (French) courses was of 1433 participants (607 women – 42 percent) from 160 countries or areas. Out of the total registered, 615 have received a certificate of completion. Overall, the average score and satisfaction rates for both courses were of 75 and 88 percent respectively.

For the SITS 2023 English course alone, this year there was a total of 1024 participants registered (463 women – 45 percent) from 149 countries or areas. Out of all registered and accepted candidates, 621 participants initiated their activities in the course and 474 have completed it receiving a certificate of completion. Overall, the course was met with success and interaction. The average score and satisfaction rates for the course were at very high levels of 74 and 88 percent respectively.

The course was delivered via the TrainForTrade distance learning platform. In this platform, participants had access to manuals, multimedia presentations, modules, evaluations, opinion polls, and forums created for each module for discussion with the instructor and other participants.

The main objectives of the course on Trade in Services Statistics are to improve and enhance statisticians' ability to do their work, and to help them better understand the user manual on Statistics of International Trade in Services (MSITS 2010). The global objective of the eLearning courses is to provide smoother accessibility and complete training material for those involved in the collection, compilation, and dissemination of statistical data.

Note: This report presents results mainly for the SITS 2023 course. At times there is some information presented for the SCIS 2023 course or other trade statistics courses as well and in such cases, it is clearly noted.

## Background

The development of a sound statistical system is a key to the implementation of evidence-based policies and to the emergence of an open and unbiased dialogue between stakeholders and policy makers. Therefore, it is an essential tool of both economic performance and social cohesion.

This is especially true when trade negotiations are under way and when countries understand and precisely assess their offensive and defensive interests in this context. In such a situation, public authorities must define a global strategy and to translate this approach into specific negotiating positions. Statistics are a key tool in this process. They allow the sharing of a diagnostic of the current situation between all national stakeholders and a clear understanding of the national interests.

While internationally agreed statistical definitions, concepts and methodologies for trade in goods statistics are long established and generally well implemented around the world, the same cannot be said for trade in services statistics. Although internationally agreed statistical definitions, concepts and methodologies for trade in services statistics now exist, these are still relatively new, and their global implementation is uneven. Now, services represent a key component of the economic activity in every country and a fast-growing component of international trade, now account for 1/5th of all international trade by value measured only on a Balance of Payments basis. In addition, they are the subject of multilateral, regional and bilateral negotiations all over the world. Hence the acute necessity to develop the corresponding statistics on a sound and harmonized basis.

UNCTAD is the United Nations' focal point for the integrated treatment of trade and development and the interrelated issues in the areas of finance, technology, investment and sustainable development. UNCTAD compiles, validates and processes a wide range of data collected from national and international sources.



This TrainForTrade course is a response to several demands for technical assistance in the compilation of trade in services statistics and directly addresses the aims of Goal 17 of Agenda 2030 for Sustainable Development. This course has been developed and produced jointly by UNCTAD, the World Trade Organization (WTO) and the United Nations Statistics Division (UNSD). It has also benefited from the close collaboration of the Inter-Agency Task Force on 'Statistics of International Trade and Services'.




Figure 1. Course participants' roles in SITS 2023 (English) and SCIS 2023 (French) courses

Both courses "Statistics on International Trade in Services" (SITS) (in English) and "Statistiques du Commerce International des Services" (SCIS) (in French) are part of a bigger initiative undertaken by the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD), in cooperation with United Nations Statistics Division (UNSD) and the World Trade Organization (WTO). Its objective is to run trade statistics courses on a yearly basis. Apart from SITS and SCIS courses, the initiative also comprises "International Merchandise Trade Statistics" (IMTS) (in English) and "Statistiques du Commerce International des Marchandises" (SCIS) (in French). As seen in Figure 1 below, since 2016 there has been growing interest in these courses and the total number of participants have exceeded 11 thousand by now. The big jump in 2019 coincides with opening the courses to all interested individuals.

## **Objectives**

The main objectives of the course on Trade in Services Statistics are to improve and enhance statisticians' ability to do their work, and to help them better understand the user manual on Statistics of International Trade in Services (MSITS 2010).

The global objective of the eLearning courses is to provide smoother accessibility and complete training material for those involved in the collection, compilation and dissemination of statistical data. Although the focus of the course is primarily on services trade statistics, it is also placed in a broader context of SNA2008 and BPM6 (2016) frameworks.

## **Programme Outline**

The training package consists of six modules presented below and delivered in a period of six weeks. For a detailed agenda please refer to Annex 1: Agenda of the e-learning course. Every module includes



a participant's manual with an interactive video helping understand the manual's contents and a discussion forum. After each module participants were asked to complete a test and an opinion questionnaire.

- 2. Setting up Pre-requisites for Data Collection and Compilation
- 3. Data sources & Collection
- 4. Data Compilation (BOP STIS)
- 5. Data Compilation (FATS)
- 6. Dissemination and Analysis

## **Course Participants**



A total of 1024 participants (463 women – 45%) from 149 countries registered and were selected to participate in the SITS 2023 course. Out of the total of 1024 registered and accepted candidates, 621 participants initiated their activities in the course and 473 have completed it receiving a certificate of completion.

As shown in Figure 2, 49 percent of participants of SITS 2023 course consider themselves as both user and producers of trade statistics. Additionally, 32 percent were users only while only 16 percent were producers only. The percentages were quite similar for the SCIS 2023 course. This shows an interesting shift in the course population with growing interest from those who analyze and interpret these statistics. It encourages dialog and mutual understanding between compilers and users.

As also shown in Figure 3 presenting previous courses on International Merchandise Trade Statistics (IMTS for English and SCIM for French) and Statistics of International Trade in Services (SITS for English and SCIS for French), one can see an increasing interest from users and analysts of trade statistics to follow these courses.




Figure 4. Course participants' institution in SITS 2023 (English) and SCIS 2023 (French) courses

In Figure 4, one can observe that 21 percent of the SITS 2023 course participants belonged to a national statical office. The other percentages include 19 percent to port authority followed by 12 percent to private enterprise. For SCIS 2023, the composition of participants was quite different with higher participation from port authority and ministries.

## Delivery of the Course

The on-line courses were conducted from 11 September to 20 October 2023 in English and French with follow-up webinars organized on 31 October (in English) and 1 November 2023 (in French). Registration and course participation were free of charge. Registered trainees were accepted and provided with the online platform user guide and the credentials to log-on to the TrainForTrade e-learning platform.

The e-learning courses were conducted according to the established schedule (see Annex 1: Agenda of the e-learning course). During the six-week period, participants had the opportunity to go through six modules of the course to learn through various multimedia means available in the e-learning platform (manuals and videos) and to interact with other participants from different countries, facilitators, and experts in the discussion fora. Trainees had the flexibility to study and participate in the fora of the different sections of the course, generating enriching discussions and allowing the exchange of information, ideas, and experiences. At the end of each week, participants were evaluated through an on-line test. Additionally, at the end of each week and at the end of the course, participants were invited to share their feedback and suggestions. This information was used to improve the training material and the organization of the course in the future (for more information, refer to the Course Evaluation section below).

## **Course Results**

At the end of each module, participants were invited to evaluate their knowledge through a quiz. The average grade for specific modules for different years and languages were ranging between 65 and 88 percent (see figure below).

#### Discussions in the forum

Participants engaged in discussions and exchanges with experts in the course forum. There was a total of 650 posts exchanged mostly focusing on topics covered by the course. Brief overview can be found in the figure below.

#### Main moderators for the fora:

Ms. Barbara d'Andrea from WTO, Mr. Vysaul Nyirongo and Mr. Markie Muryawan from UNSD and Ms. Sanja Blazevic from UNCTAD replied to specific questions asked by participants in the online fora. Mr. Dominique Chantrel, Mr. Tomasz Kulaga and Ms. Lili Flour from UNCTAD/TrainForTrade moderated the discussions in the fora and provided technical assistance.

#### **Course Evaluation**

The evaluation of the modules and the course itself has been designed to assess the learning process of the participants, the accuracy of the training material and the organization of the course, taking into account different aspects such as the quality of the training material, the organization of the module, the module subjects, etc.


Each week, participants were asked to complete the opinion questionnaire about the modules they had just completed. They were also invited to evaluate the course at the end. The satisfaction rate for all the modules for different years and languages were at very high levels between 68 and 93 percent (see the figures below).

#### Final Opinion Questionnaire

Below there are a few excerpts from the final feedback form.

#### Strengths of the course

The most popular strengths of the course were the high level of detail provided, the courses organized structure and the effectiveness of making a complex topic easy to understand.

"Summarizing such a dense topic in specific modules allows the user to gradually understand it and grasp the key elements for each section, it also facilitates the retention of the information explained."

"The strengths of the course are the detail of the information within the presentation and the manual."

"The course was written and in an organized manner. It is easy to follow."

"A very clear course that effectively describes a very complicated topic."

"The strength of the course is the level of detail given on each topic. It was very comprehensive and clear."

"The course was streamlined and well-constructed with properly defined questions."

#### Aspects to be improved

There were several requests for more time to complete the course. Many found the density of the topic to be intensive, necessitating the need for more time to finish module activities. This demand may be aligned with the increase in statistics users as participants compared to the target population which is statistics producers.

"In my opinion, the length of the course should be extended to allow the participants to get a better grasp of the information in the manual."



"The duration of the course is too short. It is a lot of information to digest."

"Extending the duration of the course to allow all learners sufficient time to complete the course in view of its importance and usefulness in improving professional skills."

Another popular suggestion in the feedback was to have more practical information and examples in the course materials including requests for case studies and country specific examples.

"Possibly include more practical illustrations for the course in order to enhance understanding of the participants who may be new to the course content."

"The introduction of case studies can make participants understand the concept more."

"I would be glad to see even more practical examples."

"To better understand some of the implications, I think it would be helpful to include more case studies and examples that highlight the most important aspects of each module/chapter."

Many also requested summaries at the end of the modules, such as at the end of the manual chapters and videos.

"My suggestions is we should summarize our slides very and strengthen to the point."

#### Course impact




Figure 9. SITS 2023 course impact

Figure 9 provides a visual of the course impact as reflected upon by participants. Overall, almost all participants feel they have increased their knowledge (95 per cent) and believe this new understanding of the course topic will assist in their professional work performance (92 per cent).



The webinars were joined by Ms. Barbara d'Andrea from WTO, Mr. Vysaul Nyirongo, Mr. Markie Muryawan and Ms. Jiayue Zeng from UNSD and Ms. Anu Peltola and Ms. Sanja Blazevic from UNCTAD. The events were moderated and supported by Mr. Dominique Chantrel, Mr. Tomasz Kulaga and Ms. Lili Flour from UNCTAD/TrainForTrade.

The webinars were conducted via Zoom platform. The slides shared in the event and its recording is available to course participants on the course platform.

## **Conclusions**

The course enhanced capacities and enabled exchanges and sharing practices between 1024 trade practitioners from 149 countries or areas. According to the analysis of the course evaluation, the methodology used to deliver the course tools and resources provided through the distance learning platform succeeded in various aspects such as the quality of the training material and the efficiency of the module. Feedbacks highlighted the richness of discussions and innovative approaches, but also the relevance of module subjects in view of the added value participants gained towards their field of work. Moreover, to improve the course, comments from the participants were analyzed and will be used to elaborate on future courses. Eventually, the e-learning process was well adapted and organized.
